Presentations

RORG Landscape Designer Layne Knoche was featured in two episodes of Extension's *Good Growing* podcast for a discussion on favorite native plants. Specially featured was RORG's Red Chokeberry (*Aronia arbutifolia*).

Progress toward Community Stewardship Challenge Grant

In partnership with the <u>Champaign County Design & Conservation Foundation</u>, RORG received a Community Stewardship Challenge Grant from the <u>Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation</u> (ICECF). This grant helps natural areas establish relationships with new donors and/or to raise new support that can be directed towards stewardship. They match donations 3:1 up to \$7,000 and provide \$6,000 for volunteer hours for a total of \$32,000. **In January, we met our fundraising goal of \$7,000! As of February 28, we have recorded 265 volunteer hours of the 400 we need by August 31.**

January Activity

• Plant Life

Songbirds, especially Robins, <u>were seen</u> finishing off the remaining berries from Winterberry and Red Chokeberry, which is typical for late-winter. A mid-month snowstorm brought the season's biggest snowfall, with around 8 inches. The deep blanket of snow and sun the following day highlighted beautiful shadows cast by the Red Oak and Sycamore trees, as well as the various shrubs throughout the garden.

• Monitoring

Precipitation: 2.05" of liquid-equivalent precipitation was reported by the CoCoRaHS rain gauge watchers for the month.

• Red Oak Health

Extension Horticulture Educator Ryan Pankau is finalizing plans to apply mycorrhizae and

Cambistat around the Red Oak and is working with F&S. These will be applied in early spring and will be accompanied by a guest blog to explain the importance of these practices.

• Boardwalk Bridge Update

RORG Director Eliana Brown and volunteer Shannon Tucker report that we're on track to build the boardwalk bridge late-May/early-June. Micah Putman of Allerton Park has delivered Black Locust trees to The Woodshop, a local lumber mill, where they'll be cut into lumber. With February's below-average temperatures, milling has delayed slightly but should start back up once temperatures allow for it.

What to Watch for in March

Signs of returning plant life can be seen by mid-March. Watch for the various species of sedges to begin greening up. The tulips, Virginia Bluebells, and other spring ephemerals planted last fall will start to emerge with the first warm spell.

Upcoming Volunteer Opportunities

The Red Oak Rain Garden team seeks volunteers to help wake up the garden for the 2021 growing season! With spring just around the corner, volunteers will gain first-hand experience in early-season rain garden maintenance and will have the opportunity to work with dozens of native plant species. Masks will be required. Thanks to our wonderful supporters, newly purchased tools will be provided, but feel free to bring along your favorite rake or pruning shears. Weather permitting, workdays will occur:
