Public Engagement

Volunteer Highlights:

Regular workdays occur each Friday from 9:00-11:00am, weather dependent. The RORG Team and regular volunteers have continued to welcome and train new volunteers from the Champaign County Master Gardeners and East Central Illinois Master Naturalist programs. Several volunteer workdays took place throughout September. See "Fall 2021 Projects" below.

Fall 2021 Projects:

With funds from the <u>Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation Community Stewardship</u> <u>Challenge Grant</u>, the RORG team expanded the rain garden with an additional 1,400 plants and installed several trees between RORG and the McKinley Health Center parking lot. Work is ongoing around the Dorner Drive Retention Pond to convert what had been poor quality lowmow with high-quality native vegetation.

Champaign County Master Gardener & East Central Illinois Master Naturalist volunteers, UIUC students from Landscape Architecture and Horticulture, Girl Scout Troop #2915, and the student

organizations of ASLA and SWE participated in the installation and gained valuable hands-on experience at RORG.

In the Garden

September Activity

• Plant Life

Summer blooms began to fade as the fall season took over. However, the warm temperatures and typical precipitation have kept a few summer stragglers around, such as Cardinal Flower and Tall Bellflower. These species are blooming unusually late this year. Asters, Black Eyed Susan, and White Turtlehead are currently in peak bloom. <u>See our full plant library</u>.

• Monitoring

Precipitation: Our <u>CoCoRaHS</u> rain gauge watchers reported 3.04 inches of precipitation. The average for September is 3.10 inches.

• Field Guide Update

The RORG Team worked with Extension's Justin Klett on developing a handheld field guide to be used by volunteers working in the garden. The guide will include species identification cards for all of RORG's plant species, including new species added this fall. Identification cards for a variety of weeds known to be in the garden will be created as well.

What to Watch for in October

Our native shrubs such as Spicebush (*Lindera benzoin*) and Red Chokeberry (*Aronia arbutifolia*) will begin their fall color displays in the second half of the month. Fall blooming native species like Smooth Blue Aster (*Symphyotrichum laeve*) and Black Eyed Susan (*Rudbeckia fulgida*) will continue their floral shows, even through our first frosts and freezes that typically occur in the second half of the month.

Nearby trees will begin to change color towards the end of the month, as well. In particular, Bald Cypress (*Taxodium distichum*), located around the Dorner Drive Retention Pond just to the south of the garden, are so beautiful in the fall that we decided to plant three new ones just east of the garden. We also installed three new Black Gum (*Nyssa sylvatica*) trees on the southeast side of the garden, as well as several Bottlebrush Buckeyes (*Aesculus parviflora*). The combination of these new trees and shrubs will add to the beautiful fall color we already had in the area!

Pollinators will still be very active through at least the first half of the month, as they prepare for the upcoming winter. Migrating birds have been seen in and around the garden, and the last of the Monarch Butterflies can be seen as they make their way south to Mexico, where they will overwinter.

Upcoming Volunteer Opportunities

The garden is being kept beautiful with the help of volunteers from the <u>Champaign County Master</u> <u>Gardeners</u> and <u>East Central Illinois Master Naturalists</u>, who have started a regular workday each Friday morning from 9:00-11:00am. Volunteers are needed throughout the growing season to help with various garden-care activities.
