In the Garden

July Activity

• Plant Life

Showy summer blooms include Purple Poppy Mallow, Purple Coneflower, 'Rozanne' Geranium, Butterflyweed, Yellow Coneflower, Royal Catchfly, Cardinal Flower, Joe Pye Weed, Tall Bellflower, and Rosinweed. Nodding Onion, installed in Fall 2020, is performing very well and was a great addition to the garden. <u>See our full plant library</u>.

Monitoring

Precipitation: Our <u>CoCoRaHS</u> rain gauge watchers reported 3.62 inches of precipitation. The average for July is 4.5 inches.

• Boardwalk Bridge Update

The boardwalk bridge officially opened to the public on July 21. Visitors to the garden have been thrilled to cross it!

• Field Guide Update

The RORG Team is working with Extension's Justin Klett on developing a handheld field guide to be used by volunteers working in the garden. The guide, which is nearing completion, will include species identification cards for each of RORG's 54 species, as well as cards for a variety of weeds that pop up in the garden.

What to Watch for in August

While Cardinal Flower has reached its peak bloom, sporadic blooms will last for another two months. In the meantime, watch for Ruby-throated Hummingbirds that have been seen many times visiting the flowers. Black Eyed Susan will be in full bloom later this month. Other species in bloom include Joe Pye Weed, Purple Coneflower, 'Rozanne' Geranium, Purple Poppy Mallow, Butterflyweed, Rosinweed, Compass Plant, Yellow Coneflower, and Royal Catchfly. Many species of butterflies and other pollinators are coming into the garden to take advantage of the plentiful blooms from our native plants, especially Yellow Coneflower, Purple Coneflower, and Joe Pye Weed. Monarch caterpillars can be seen munching on Butterflyweed and Swamp Milkweed in the sunny areas of the garden.

Upcoming Volunteer Opportunities

The garden is being kept beautiful with the help of volunteers from the <u>Champaign County Master</u> <u>Gardeners</u> and <u>East Central Illinois Master Naturalists</u>, who have started a regular workday each Friday morning from 9:00-11:00am. Volunteers are needed throughout the growing season to help with various garden-care activities.
