



 - is shared














What does the Sustainable Transportation Assistant do?


- Manage the bicycle network on campus

UIUC at a glance



Faculty and Staff – Primary mode of travel 55% drive alone, which is down from 60% from 2019 Mode Share survey



45% walk, which is up from 37% from 2019 Mode Share survey. Nearly 88% use active modes of transportation

Walking and Running

- Most sustainable form of transportation
- Very walkable campus

Bike at Illinois

- Campus initiative to promote bicycling on campus and community

 - \$10 bicycle registration fee

 - https://go.Illinois.edu/mybike




Transit

- MTD provides transit service for campus and community
 - Currently operating 24 bus routes
 - University ID serves as a bus pass for all students and staff
 - All buses are ADA accessible and equipped with bike racks
- DRES provides curb-to-curb paratransit rides on campus
- Intercity Travel by bus or train at the Illinois Terminal
