The Women's Resources Center in partnership with other cultural and resource centers seeks to host an Intersectional Environmental Justice Summit dedicated to bridging the topics of environmental justice, identity, feminism, social justice, and indigenous knowledge in the conversation of environmentality the summit, cultural and resource centers will each host events exploring environmental justice issues most impacting the communities they represent and highlighting the effort of leaders from historically under-recognized and marginalized communities. Programs will include lectures, workshops, film screenings, and book clubs, each designed to provide students with unique opportunities to further explore environmental theory and praxis.

One of the primary goals of the 2023 Ecofeminism Summit was to highlight and uplift the voices of Indigenous scholars, youth leaders, and Women of Color and center their ways of learning and knowing as we explored the theory and praxis of Ecofeminism. We understand that the modern sustainability movement is often centered around whiteness and Eurocentric values and our program seeks to decolonialize environmentalism.

With this project, we hope to build on the success of the Ecofeminism Summit in highlighting the intersections of social justice, environmental justice and feminist theory by expanding our focus and partnerships. By inviting each cultural and resource center to consider the ways in which environmental justice is most salient in their communities and highlight the leadership and resilience of diverse communities around environmental issues, we aim to expand understanding of the ways in which climate justice can be achieved and broaden which students at Illinois see themselves as vital to the movement.

The Summit's deliverables include: (1) Summit participants will demonstrate an improved understanding of the intersections of social oppression and environmental justice; (2) Summit participants will have an increased awareness of opportunities to get involved in campus environmental and/or racial and gender justice activities.

The planning committee currently has representation from La Casa Cultural Latina, Native American House, Salaam MENA, Diversity and Social Justice Education, and International Education in addition to the Women's Resources Center. Asian American Cultural Center and Bruce Nesbitt African American Cultural Center expressed interest but are unable to commit until they address staffing shortages. In early planning discussions, partners expressed an interest in using this series as a foundation for a collaborative Summit that would deeply explore the intersections of these issues (proposed to be held in Spring or Fail 2025). The series will serve as groundwork to highlight environmental work in the context of identity-based exploration and to engage with students who are interested in these intersections. Out of these efforts, we hope to identify a group of students interested in planning the Intersectional Environmental Justice Summit to highlight the ways in which environmental issues across communities are interdependent and solutions that reflect this complexity. The Summit will also focus on opportunities for student leaders to identify ways to collaboratively address these issues. Please note that we have chosen not to apply for funding for this Summit, at this time. Rather, we are excited to start with this series and see how we are able to build on if for the future

32. Environmental Impact:

How does your project increase environmental stewardship at UIUC? If applicable, what is the carbon, water, waste, and/or energy savings? *

This series of educational events explicitly aims to draw in students that may not encounter sustainability material in their general education. Students studying a broad set of disciplines, including Gender and Women's Studies, Community Health, Political Science, Cultural and Area Studies, and Interdisciplinary Health, are typical students that frequent programs hosted by the University of Illinois' cultural and resource Centers. By capitalizing on existing program spaces with diverse audiences (Lunch on Us/Dinner on Us, Global Engagement Lounge, etc.) our program will increase exposure to sustainability, highlight opportunities to take action or get involved, and explore opportunities for collaboration across identities and groups. Bringing in other campus units will also help to generate conversations about our sustainability practices within host organizations (for example/ how can we most sustainabily source servingware for the Lunch on Us/Dinner on Us programs?). Finally, it makes our culture and society more resilient. By challenging dominant, and sometimes oppressive, ideologies, this summit is an opportunity for the campus to collectively envision a new way to operate and reorganize old ways of thinking and doing. In educating students on these topics, we shed light on new perspectives and encourage them to take personal and community action towards sustainability, racial equity and gender justice. By drawing connections between theory and practical application, we empower university members to think critically and creatively and take action.
