Funding Application – Student-Led Projects (Under \$10K)

Funding Criteria

A. General Rules

- 1. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to submit requests for funding. Student-led projects require a faculty or staff sponsor in order to have funds awarded.
- 2. Funding can only go to university-affiliated projects from students, faculty, staff, and departments.
- 3. All SSC projects must make a substantial impact on students. This may be a direct impact or an impact through education and engagement. All SSC funding is 100% from student green fees, so the projects funded by the students must benefit them.
- 4. SSC encourages innovation and new technologies creative projects are encouraged to apply.
- 5. Unless a type of expense is specifically listed below as having restrictions, SSC can generally fund it. The items referenced below should not be taken as comprehensive list.

B. Things SSC Can Fund, On A Case-By-Case Basis

- 1. SSC can fund feasibility studies and design work; however, it must work toward ultimately addressing a sustainability need on campus.
- 2. SSC can fund staff positions that are related to improving campus sustainability. Strong preference will be given to proposals receiving matching funding from departments and/or plans for maintaining continuity of the position after the end of the initial grant.
- 3. SSC can fund outreach events with a central theme of sustainability, provided their primary audience is the general campus community.
- 4. SSC discourages funding requests for food and prizes but will consider proposals on a case by case basis that prove significant reasoning.
- 5. SSC can fund repairs and improvements to existing building systems as long as it works toward the goal of improving campus sustainability; however, a preference is shown to projects utilizing new or innovative ideas.
- 6. SSC can provide departments with loans for projects with a distinct payback on a case by case base. Loans will require a separate memorandum of understanding between SSC and departmental leadership pledging to repay the award in full and detailing the payback plan.

C. Things SSC Will Not Fund:

- 1. SSC will not fund projects with a primary end goal of generating revenue for non-University entities.
- 2. SSC will not fund personal lodging, food, beverage, and other travel expenses.
- 3. SSC will not fund any travel expenses.
- 4. SSC will not fund tuition or other forms of personal financial assistance for students beyond standard student employee wages.

We want to know: What is your project? What does it concretely produce, accomplish, or solve? Why is this project needed on campus?

MFSTSA is hosting four guest speakers to talk with students in our virtual "MFSTSA Talk Series: Reimagining Our Food Systems". This talk series will feature entrepreneurs and educators of color who are working to transform our current food system, particularly by examining race and food justice on a deeper level. Because our goal is to promote food systems education across all interests and areas of study, we are asking for funding to provide an honorarium to one of our guest speakers who is coming from a well known non-profit organization, Urban Growers Collective, in Chicago. Additionally, we would like funding to print posters as promotional materials to attract as many interested students on campus as possible. Because food justice has been relatively less explored as a concept within the food-environment nexus on the UIUC campus, we are hoping this talk series will highlight food justice as a legitimate concern in the field of food sustainability. Finally, we would like to be able to hire ASL interpreter so that our virtual talk-series is accessible to as many people as possible. Aligning with our goals of social justice in food systems education, we believe that having a sign language interpreter is essential to social sustainability.

Guest speakers at this talk series include: Erika Allen, Dr. Bobby Smith II, Dr. Lila Adib Sharif, and Dr. Janett Barragan Miranda. This project is affilated with the Food Recovery Network UIUC Chapter, which is composed of two RSOs: the Metropolitan Food and Environmental Systems Student Association (MFSTSA) and Project4Less. The UIUC Chapter of FRN is part of the larger FRN national network. FRN is not funding this project, but they plan to promote each speaker of our talk series on their social media, using promotional materials we will design. The Department of Metropolitan Food and Environmental Systems in the College of ACES is affiliated with this project.

How will this project involve and/or benefit students?

This includes both direct and indirect impact.

Many people are unaware of the concept of food systems and the complex interactions that occur between producers, communties, and governments that surround food. With the MFSTSA talk series, students will learn about the food system and understand how it impacts communties of color. UIUC students will have the opportunity to hear about the educational and career paths of food systems experts and learn more about their personal experiences. The talk series will expose students to different careers within the food system and highlight how to pursue those goals.

What are your specific outreach goals? How will this project inspire change at UIUC?

We hope students from all colleges and majors across UIUC attend this event to become more aware of the invisible yet vast food system that shapes what they eat. We also want students to understand the power they have to influence the food system by becoming involved in local food systems, growing their own food, and developing sustainable diets. Students will become more aware of racial disparities across the food system and hopefully be inspired to support these causes.

How will the project improve environmental sustainability at the Urbana-Champaign campus?

The project will encourage students to think more in depth about the consequences of their food choices and the power they have as individual consumers. After attending the talk series, students will realize how much work goes into producing simple food items. We hope the events will motivate students to reduce their personal waste and make concious decisions which purchasing food.

If applicable, how does this project impact environmental injustice or social injustice?

The talk series will reveal to students the ways in which minority communities are harmed and excluded from the food system. Students will learn how this exclusion has created cascading economic and social consequences that have shaped the world we live in today. UIUC students may come from food desert areas and have experienced food insecurity while at home; we believe it is important for all students to understand this struggle and the complex interactions behind it. This talk series will highlight how the inclusion of minority communities in the food system paves the way for entreprenuership, social justice, decreased poverty, and improved health outcomes.
